We contribute to the reduction of the incidence and consequences of violence against children through prevention activities, advocacy, capacity building, and the provision of specialized services.

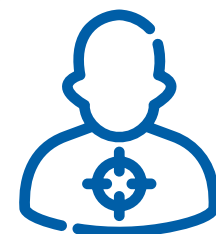

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT



For CNPAC, 2024 was a year marked not only by challenges but also by achievements that prove how much we can accomplish together in building a safer world for children. We continue to be both the voice that calls for change and the hand that provides direct support—ensuring every child is protected and treated with dignity.

In numbers, this meant more than 7,000 children engaged in CNPAC's programs and activities, including 459 children who received highly specialized services: psycho-social assistance at the Amicul Center and integrated services at Barnahus North—the first two services of their kind in the Republic of Moldova. Altogether, nearly 10,300 people—children and adults—were supported through our work in 2024.

CNPAC has also remained a key actor and trusted partner in organizing child hearings under special conditions and in preparing professional interviewers. At the two facilities—Barnahus North and the specialized hearing unit in Chişinău—471 child victims and witnesses of sexual crimes and domestic violence were interviewed with care and respect, with the involvement of around 1,000 justice and child protection professionals from districts across the northern and central regions of the country.

Beyond direct services, CNPAC has upheld its role as a pioneer in violence prevention and public policy change, contributing to the strengthening of national legislation and the development of intersectoral response mechanisms.

These results were made possible by the commitment of our team, the solidarity of our partners, and the confidence placed in us by our donors. We express our sincere gratitude to all who have chosen to stand alongside us in this mission.

Looking ahead, we are determined to remain both the voice that drives change and the hand that provides steadfast support to every child in their time of need.

EVENTS OF 2024



JANUARY

The National Center for the Prevention of Child Abuse (CNPAC) has marked 26 years of activity. For more than a quarter of a century, we have been actively contributing to reducing both the incidence and the consequences of violence against children through sustained efforts in prevention, advocacy, capacity building, and the provision of specialized services for child victims and their families.

In January, we launched the Specialists' Toolkit – one of the most comprehensive and practical informational resources developed by CNPAC to date. The toolkit is designed for professionals working with and on behalf of children, equipping them with practical instruments to ensure safe, prompt, and professional interventions in cases of child abuse. Also in January, Law No. 370/2023 on the Rights of the Child entered into force – a significant step forward in strengthening the national legal framework and aligning the Republic of Moldova with international standards established by the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child. Among other provisions, the new law explicitly guarantees every child's right to protection from all forms of abuse, neglect, and exploitation.



FEBRUARY

Our organization was recognized in the category NGOs Implementing Projects to Ensure Access to Justice and the Protection of Human Rights. This distinction reflects our continued commitment to strengthening an active civil society and underscores our efforts to advance the right of every child to be protected from all forms of violence.

MARCH

In 2024, we established a new group of young women actively engaged in advocacy and community mobilization efforts. Fifteen girls from diverse regions across the country united to collectively address and act against violence through the formation of the Youth Advisory Board. This platform amplifies the voices of girls, ensuring their perspectives influence decision-making processes, while also enhancing the visibility and impact of their initiatives.

During the same period, CNPAC issued a public appeal to the Ministry of Education and Research titled, Combating Violence in Schools with 21st Century Methods. The appeal advocates for the implementation of effective, innovative, and contextually relevant measures to prevent and combat violence within educational settings. This initiative garnered widespread support, with over 120 civil society organizations and human rights groups endorsing the appeal.

Additionally, CNPAC launched a series of study visits for child protection, justice, and health professionals from the southern regions to the Northern Regional Integrated Assistance Center for Child Victims and Witnesses of Crimes (Barnahus Service). These visits provided practitioners with the opportunity to observe firsthand the multidisciplinary Barnahus model—a child-centered approach that integrates coordinated interventions within a safe and supportive environment tailored to meet the unique needs of child victims and witnesses.



APRIL

In April 2023, CNPAC initiated a new training session for facilitators within the parental education program CONECT – Adolescence Explained for Parents. A total of 24 educators from 13 schools across the municipalities of Chişinău and Bălţi participated in capacity-building sessions aimed at developing essential competencies for effectively engaging with parents of adolescents.

CNPAC has formalized a collaboration agreement with the Family Justice Center of the Police (FJC), marking a significant advancement in strengthening joint efforts dedicated to the protection of children who are victims and/or witnesses of violence.

Throughout the year, FJC referred a total of 171 children to CNPAC, thereby facilitating their access to specialized services and interventions tailored to their specific needs.



The second edition of the SAFTEEN Summer School brought together 50 adolescents, who over the course of five days developed the concept for the national awareness campaign #educatiaNUdoare. In the same month, we organized the second edition of the exhibition Children's Telling Stories, where 18 displaced children from Cahul expressed, through photography, their perceptions and experiences of integration into their communities.



In July 2024, the PIDTRIMKA mobile teams concluded their critical psychosocial assistance operations. Established in March 2022, over the course of two years and five months, these teams provided essential support to more than 17,000 individuals, of whom over 11,000 were children.

During this period, with the dedicated support of the Data for Impact (D4I) project, a total of 244 professionals specializing in child protection working within Territorial Social Assistance Agencies (ATAS) and Territorial Social Assistance Structures (STAS) received targeted training.



Daniela Sîmboteanu, President of CNPAC, participated alongside 900 delegates from 73 countries at the Congress of the International Society for the Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect (ISPCAN), held in Uppsala, Sweden. The event served as a global platform to reaffirm essential measures for the prevention of child abuse and neglect.

SEPTEMBER

The platform www.12plus.md, as well as the anonymous and free chat hosted by this platform, was presented during the International Conference Innovative Approaches to Conflict Transformation and Refugee Support, held in Chişinău from September 18 to 20.



OCTOBER

Following participation in the training program for interviewers involved in the hearing of child victims and witnesses of crimes, conducted from March to August 2024, an additional 12 interviewers have been certified, bringing the total number to 28.

Furthermore, CNPAC and the Ministry of Justice of the Republic of Moldova have signed a new Cooperation Agreement aimed at strengthening joint efforts to protect children within the judicial system.



NOVEMBER

During the 19 Days of Activism for the Prevention of Violence and Abuse Against Children and Youth, CNPAC launched the national awareness campaign #educatiaNUdoare, designed by 50 adolescents from the Republic of Moldova, including refugees. The campaign culminated with a visit of the adolescents to the Ministry of Education and Research.



DECEMBER

We concluded the year 2024 with several significant events, including the panel discussion My Voice Matters, initiated by 15 adolescent girls together with a group of over 50 police officers from the Republic of Moldova. Additionally, the Government of the Republic of Moldova hosted the #educatiaNUdoare exhibition, which was implemented as part of the campaign bearing the same name.

In December, CNPAC completed the process of developing and revising Child Protection Policies in 10 educational institutions across 7 districts, with the involvement of 1,939 participants, including teachers, parents, and children. Through this initiative, schools have committed to preventing violence and protecting children from all forms of abuse.

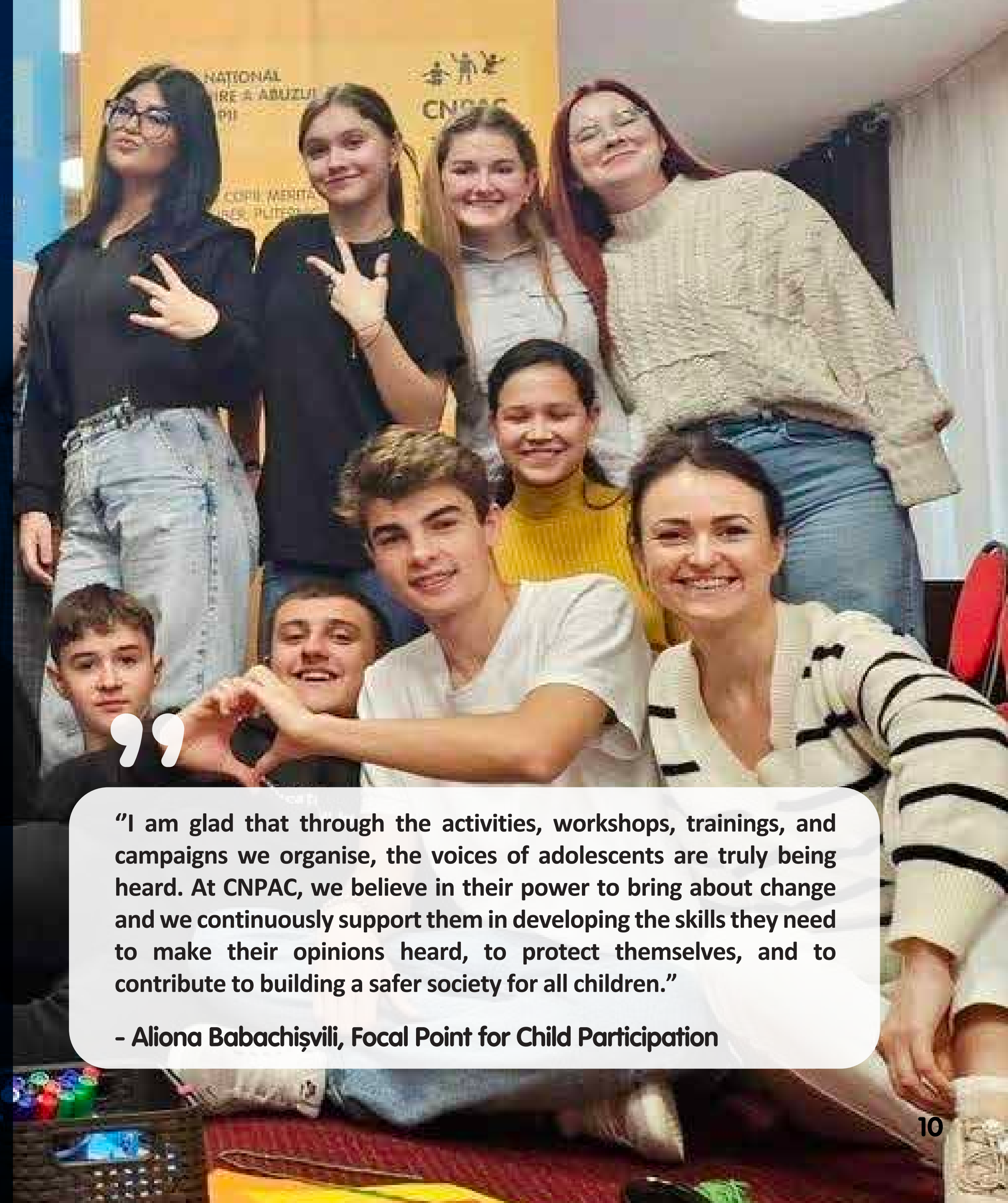
CHILDREN'S ADVISORY COUNCIL CELEBRATES ONE YEAR OF ACTIVITY

In 2024, the Children's Advisory Council (CAC) marked its first anniversary. This initiative brought together 20 adolescents from across the country, including refugee youth, providing them with the space and support needed to make their voices heard.

Throughout the year, CAC members met regularly—both online and in person—to learn, discuss, and contribute to activities that have a tangible impact on other children and young people. During these sessions, the adolescents participated in interactive workshops covering children's rights, violence prevention, non-violent communication, and the importance of civic engagement.

CAC played a crucial role in consultations for the development of three new CNPAC informational booklets targeted at children aged 5–7, 7–12, and 12+, designed to help them recognize and prevent all forms of abuse. These publications, planned for release early next year, incorporate the perspectives and language of the adolescents involved in the process.

SAFETEEN SUMMER SCHOOL, SECOND EDITION: 50 ADOLESCENTS CREATED THE #EDUCATIANUDOARE CAMPAIGN

Education should not hurt. This was the shared belief of the 50 participants of the second edition of the SAFETEEN Summer School, who, over the course of five days, learned about child participation processes, the power of children's voices and actions, and collaborated to lay the foundation for a national awareness campaign. The campaign was launched in connection with the International Day for the Prevention of Child Abuse, observed on November 19.

After identifying 11 key issues they wished to address, the participants chose to focus their efforts on education and developed the concept for the national campaign Educatia nu doare (Education shouldn't hurt).



The campaign was launched on October 31 and continued throughout the month of November. The launch event, held symbolically in the Future Classroom conference hall, brought together over 100 students, teachers, school principals, and experts in the field.

During the campaign, which coincided with the 19 Days of Activism for the Prevention of Violence and Abuse against Children and Youth, various activities were organized. These included discussions in multiple schools across the country, Peer-to-Peer activities, the creation of 10 motivational stories, and the signing of the Commitment for Friendly Education by more than 130 schools and preschools across Moldova.

The campaign concluded with the voices of the 50 adolescents who participated in creating #educatiaNUdoare being heard by the Minister of Education and Research, Dan Perciun.

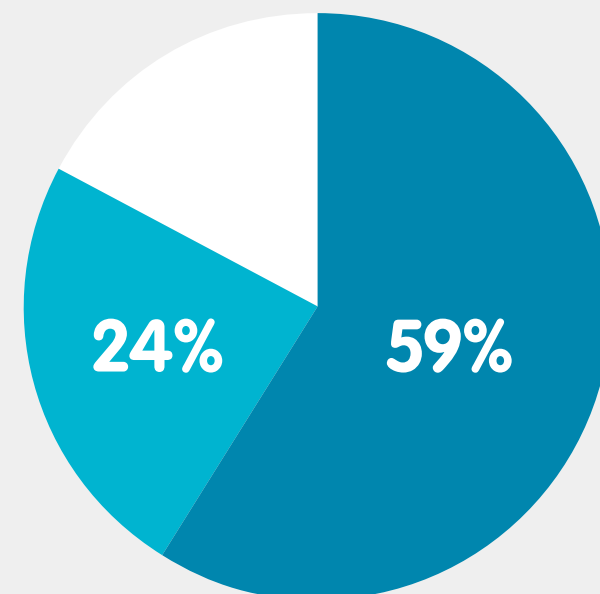

SUPPORTING THE EXPANSION OF THE BARNAHUS SERVICE TO SOUTHERN MOLDOVA (CAHUL)

In 2024, Barnahus Centre North contributed to several activities aimed at developing the **Regional Integrated Assistance Center for Child Victims of Crime – South (Cahul)**. Between February and April 2024, eight study visits were organized for specialists from southern regions of the country to Barnahus Nord, allowing them to become familiar with the principles and operational model of the Barnahus service.

Subsequently, in November, a series of training sessions was held for forensic doctors, proctologists, and gynecologists from the Bălți, Chișinău, and Cahul regions.

To deepen expertise and integrate international best practices, **CNPAC** organized a study visit to Riga, Latvia, during which a multidisciplinary group — including social service representatives, judges, prosecutors, forensic doctors, and interviewers — explored models recognized for their effectiveness in child protection.

In total, in 2024, **161 members of multidisciplinary teams** and **48 medical professionals** benefited from training and experience-sharing activities. These efforts contributed to strengthening the professional network and ensuring an integrated, high-quality response for children in southern Moldova who come into contact with the justice system.



12 MORE INTERVIEWERS TRAINED TO PROFESSIONALLY INTERVIEW CHILD VICTIMS AND WITNESSES OF VIOLENCE

In 2024, as a result of participation in the Training Program for Interviewers of Child Victims and Witnesses of Crime, held between March and August, 12 additional interviewers were certified to conduct professional interviews with children who are victims or witnesses of crimes.

The certification ceremony took place during a workshop hosted by the Ministry of Justice of the Republic of Moldova. Discussions highlighted the importance of formally regulating the status of interviewers — a crucial step to ensure the quality and continuity of this service.

With this achievement, the total number of certified interviewers in Moldova now stands at 28. Since 2015, CNPAC has continued to support and develop this network, providing ongoing training and mentorship to maintain high standards of professionalism in working with children.



COORDINATION COMMITTEE MEETING ON THE PROTECTION OF CHILD VICTIMS AND WITNESSES: EVALUATION OF THE BARNAHUS NORTH CENTER

On July 9, 2024, the second meeting of the Coordination Committee was held at the initiative of the Minister of Labour and Social Protection to evaluate the activities of the Integrated Assistance Center in the Northern region. The meeting brought together representatives of CNPAC, UNICEF Moldova, and Committee members, who emphasized the importance of an integrated approach and a collective commitment to ensuring professional and child-friendly support for children who are victims and witnesses of crime..

AMICUL CENTER'S ACTIVITIES

“We continued to support children
and families affected by violence”

Throughout 2024, the AMICUL Center for Child and Family Psychosocial Assistance and Rehabilitation continued to deliver specialized services to children and families affected by violence.

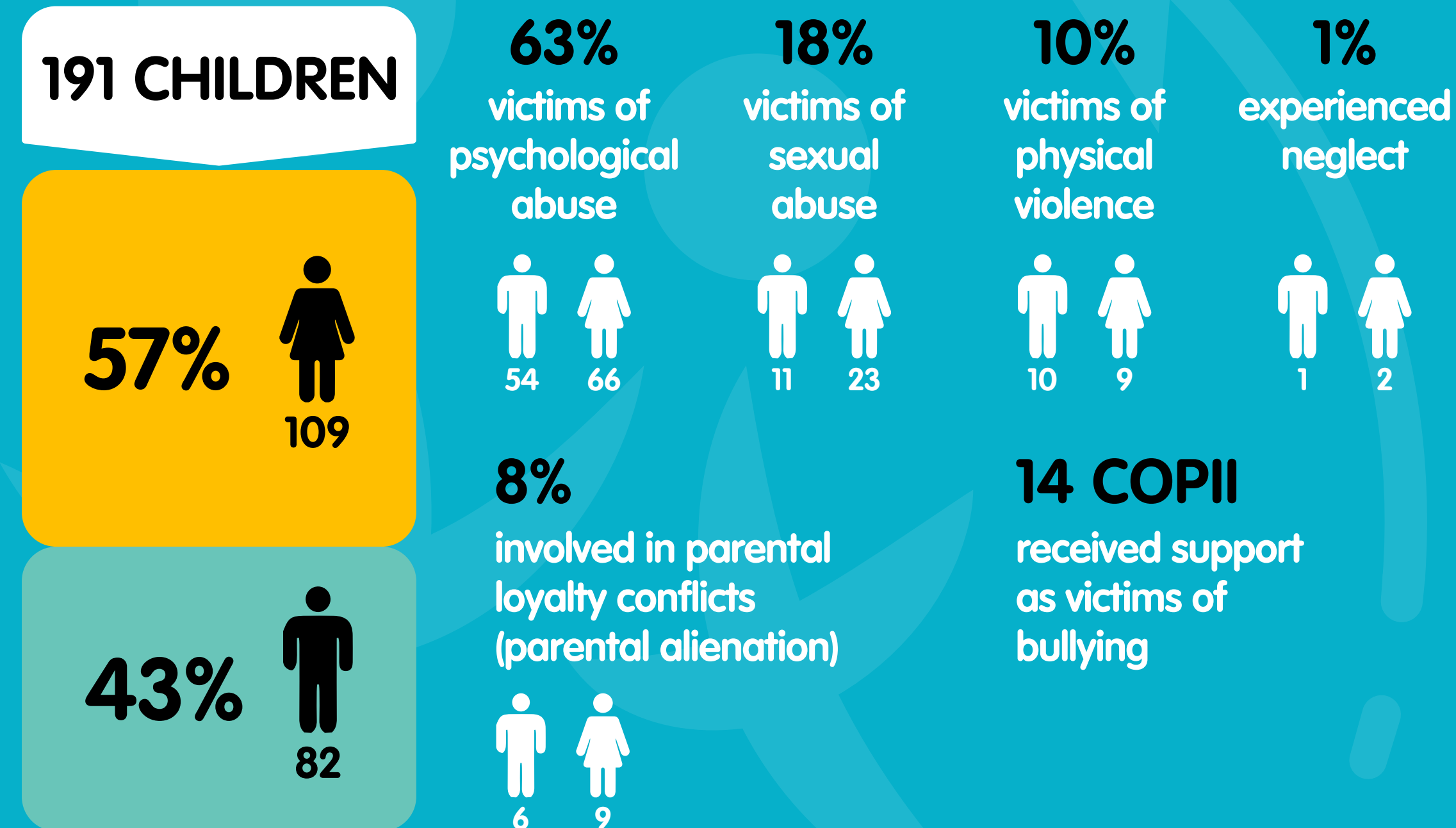
191 children received psychological support as victims of psychological abuse, sexual abuse, physical violence, neglect, and parental alienation.

156 parents and caregivers benefited from psychosocial assistance designed to enhance their understanding of children's needs and to strengthen their capacity to provide appropriate support during the recovery process.

In total, approximately 1,469 psychological counseling sessions were carried out, with the professional assistance and guidance of specialists contributing significantly to mitigating the long-term effects of violence.

In addition, in May 2024, the Amicul Center hosted a knowledge-sharing exchange with participants from Moldova, Ukraine, and Belarus. During the ERIKS partners’ meeting in Chișinău, attendees explored the activities of the Amicul Center, which provides specialized assistance to children and families affected by violence.



NEW SAFE SPACE FOR CHILDREN, MADE POSSIBLE THANKS TO THE **2% MECANISM**

Thanks to the generous individuals in Moldova who chose to redirect 2% of their income tax to CNPAC, the AMICUL Center was able to create a warm, safe, and child-friendly space tailored to the needs of children and adolescents who have experienced difficult situations.

*This “2% mechanism” is a system in Moldova that allows taxpayers to allocate a small portion of their income tax to support non-profit organizations of their choice, enabling projects that make a real difference in communities.

This space is not just a refuge—it is also a meaningful source of support for children’s recovery and healing.

OVER 220 PROFESSIONALS TRAINED IN DELIVERING CNPAC PREVENTION PROGRAMS

In 2024, **CNPAC** invested in the training of over **220 specialists** in education, psychology, and child protection. The programs were tailored to the current realities and needs of children and families in the Republic of Moldova.



CONNECT Program

NEARLY 1,000 PARENTS CHOSE A CHILDHOOD FREE FROM VIOLENCE AND FOCUSED ON GREATER UNDERSTANDING FOR THEIR CHILDREN

The program CONECT: Adolescence Explained for Parents, designed for parents of teenagers, engaged 442 participants, including parents of children with disabilities, through more than 360 sessions facilitated by 25 specialists. Despite initial challenges related to parental hesitation and logistical constraints, the program's flexible and interactive approach yielded positive outcomes. Parents reported greater understanding of adolescent development and improved strategies to prevent conflicts. Concurrently, the program Rules and Discipline for Young Children, targeting parents of young children, was delivered in 252 sessions to nearly 500 parents, including caregivers of children with disabilities. Although some participants were initially hesitant, the majority left with increased confidence and practical tools for non-violent discipline, fostering safe and nurturing parent-child relationships. Both programs were highly successful, providing parents with actionable guidance to address everyday parenting challenges and promoting positive, supportive family environments.

10 CHILD PROTECTION POLICIES REVISED WITH CNPAC SUPPORT

In 2024, CNPAC supported 10 educational institutions across 7 districts — Dondușeni, Ștefan Vodă, Orhei, Nisporeni, Hîncești, UTA Gagauzia, and Glodeni — in the development and revision of Child Protection Policies (CPPs). These policies serve as key instruments for preventing violence and safeguarding the rights of children.

A total of 10 policies were developed or revised, engaging 290 unique participants, including teachers, auxiliary staff, parents, and adolescents, in the consultation and policy development process.

A notable example is the revision of the CPP at Gymnasium No. 9 in Bălți, where 132 participants — comprising 14 teachers, 40 parents, and 78 students — actively contributed to creating a safer and more protective school environment for children.

To promote the empowerment of girls, CNPAC established the Youth Advisory Board “Girls Against Violence” at the beginning of 2024. Within this initiative, 15 girls from across the country use their voices to support advocacy actions and raise awareness on issues of gender-based violence.

One of the key initiatives developed by the adolescents over the course of a year was the awareness campaign My Voice Matters: Listen, Believe, Protect. Launched during the 16 Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence, the campaign involved dialogue with over 50 police officers nationwide, delivering a powerful message: empathy and sensitivity make a real difference for survivors of violence.

Through their active involvement, these young women are becoming agents of change in their communities, and CNPAC is proud to support them in this mission.



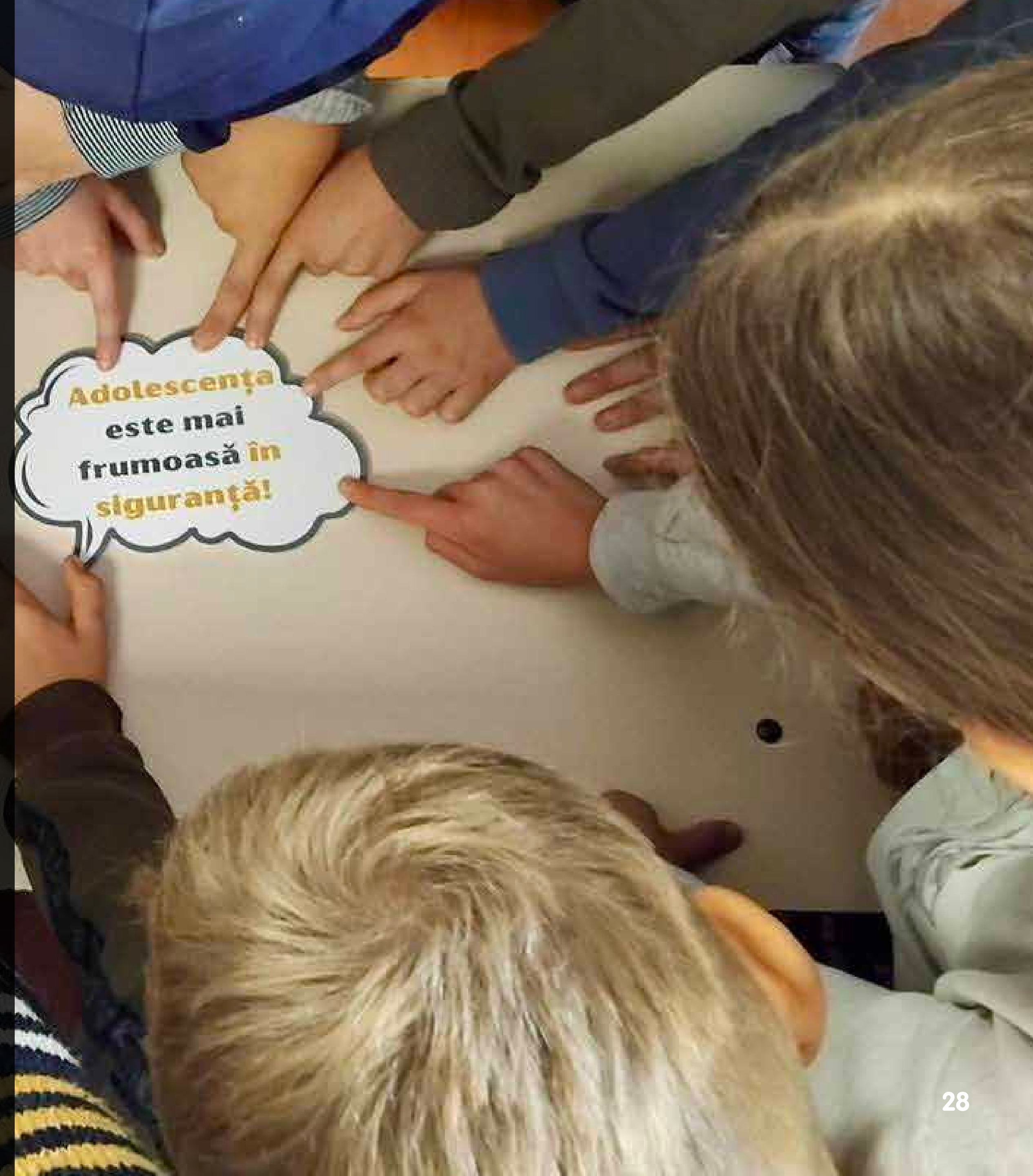

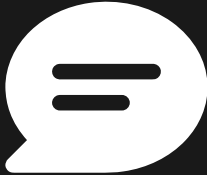

In 2024, 12plus.md and its social media accounts continued to serve as a safe, adolescent-friendly platform, remaining closely attuned to the real needs of young people. The platform’s impact is reflected in the following results:

These in-person meetings provided a space for open dialogue on sensitive topics and created real opportunities for information and support.

Through these efforts, 12plus.md has strengthened its role as a safe, relevant, and user-friendly platform, fostering a culture of protection, support, and trust among adolescents in the Republic of Moldova.

OVER 20,000 INFORMATIONAL MATERIALS DISTRIBUTED TO CHILDREN, ADOLESCENTS, PARENTS, AND PROFESSIONALS

In 2024, children, adolescents, as well as their parents and caregivers, benefited from informational resources developed by CNPAC to help guide children toward a safe and protective environment.

In total, over 20,000 informational materials were distributed, including two new publications:

- **Adolescent Employment** — a brochure that explains, in accessible language, the legal aspects and risks associated with early employment.
- **Online Safety** — a brochure offering practical advice on protecting privacy, preventing exploitation, and maintaining responsible behavior in the digital environment.

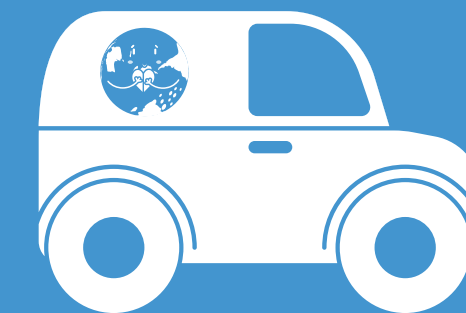

In 2024, we concluded a phase in the history of the National Center for Child Abuse Prevention (CNPAC) that was as emotional as it was demanding. This concerns the PIDTRIMKA Mobile Psychosocial Assistance Service, established in early March 2022, just days after the invasion of Ukraine.

COLLABORATION AGREEMENTS SIGNED IN 2024

- ✓ The first agreement of 2024 was signed with the Family Justice Center of the Police (FJS), through which both CNPAC and the Center committed to continuing joint efforts to ensure child-friendly justice for children who are victims and/or witnesses of violence.
- ✓ The best interests of child victims/witnesses of crimes will also remain a priority within the RESTART reform, thanks to the Regional Barnahus Center for Integrated Assistance of Children Victims/Witnesses of Crimes. On July 23, the National Center for Child Abuse Prevention (as the service provider of the Barnahus model) and the four Territorial Social Assistance Agencies from the North region renewed their collaboration agreements, aiming to prevent the re-traumatization of children during the evidence-gathering process in criminal cases.
- ✓ In the context of the national awareness campaign launched by CNPAC – #educatiaNUdoare (Education Shouldn't Hurt) – a long-term collaboration with the Ion Creangă State Pedagogical University was formalized.
- ✓ On September 28, CNPAC and the National Agency for Preventing and Combating Violence Against Women and Domestic Violence (ANPCV) signed a cooperation agreement to ensure safe, violence-free environments for children in Moldova, as well as to strengthen the prevention and response to domestic violence.
- ✓ Subsequently, on October 1, 2024, CNPAC and the Ministry of Justice of the Republic of Moldova signed a new cooperation agreement to reinforce joint efforts in protecting children within the judicial system.
- ✓ The year concluded with the signing of a cooperation agreement with the National Prison Administration, with the primary aim of supporting women in detention..
